Charles (Chuck) D. Leayman, 68, of Lancaster, PA went to be with the Lord on Tuesday, January 20, 2015 at the Lancaster General Hospital. Charles was born in Lancaster, PA. He was the son of the late Charles Berntheizel and Esther Groves Leayman.

Chuck graduated from Lancaster Catholic High School in 1964. He worked at Franklin and Marshall College for 34 years in the Martin Science Library as a Library Assistant. He was a deeply spiritual, intelligent, gentle man and was very knowledgeable about art, literature, politics, music and film. He would carry lively conversations with many people in the Lancaster community and enjoyed engaging in long talks with his sister, nieces and nephews. He was an active member of Westminster Presbyterian Church serving as an usher and involved in Christian Education.

He is survived by his sister Michelle Stauffer of Mount Joy, PA and niece Lindsay Carney of Middletown, PA, a nephew Luke Stauffer of Mount Joy, PA, two great nephews Ian and Gavin Strausbaugh, a great niece Rowan Miller and numerous cousins.

“ *When I was a teenager in the early 1980s, going to Barr-Hurst Bookstore and talking with Chuck about movies was part of my Saturday afternoon routine. He sold me my first book about Alfred Hitchcock (Hitchcock's Films, by Robin Wood), and we shared the same favorite movie: Psycho. I will never forget asking Chuck to name his favorite shot or camera move in Psycho. As a teenager impressed by flash, I expected him to choose something like a shot from the infamous shower scene, or maybe of Martin Balsam tumbling backwards down the stairs. Chuck surprised me by mentioning a brief dolly shot in the movie's first scene, a camera move I hadn't even noticed. Chuck explained that the camera moves in closer to Marion Crane (Janet Leigh) as a subtle way of increasing the audience's sympathy with the vulnerability of her character. Chuck's observation split open my teenage brain, and it forever after shaped the way I looked at movies and appreciated the subtleties of film direction. (In fact, his single observation has stuck with me as much as anything I learned in four years of film school.) For other reasons as well, Chuck was also a positive role model to me when I was figuring out the kind of man I was going to grow up to be. About 10 years ago I wrote Chuck a letter thanking him for being such an unconscious mentor to me. I never heard back from him, but I hope he received the letter and was able to appreciate my gratitude. His senseless death breaks my heart, and I am so sorry for his family and friends.*
