Frank Cascio, 90, of Lancaster, died at the Mennonite Home on Wednesday, November 2, 2011. He was the son of the late Frank and Helen Wicks Cascio. He was a devoted husband to Ruth Woolley Cascio with whom he would have celebrated 50 years of marriage on December 1, 2011.

Frank graduated from Pace College and Brooklyn Law School. An attorney and accountant, he practiced Law on Long Island, New York. He was a Corporal in the United States Army.
