Kenneth W. Ehrhart, Jr. of Lancaster, PA passed away peacefully, surrounded by family and friends, at his home on Saturday, December 7th, 2024. He was 71 years of age.

Ken was born in Gettysburg, PA, to the late Dr. Kenneth Ehrhart, Sr. and Betty (Nace). He was raised in Hanover, PA, and following his mother's death, his family grew to include his stepmother, Margaret, and her four children, Sandra Cromer (Jay), Teresa Harbert (Ray), Thomas Mann (Bobbi), and Douglas Mann (Laine). He could always be counted on to bring fun and laughter to the Hanover family holidays.

Ken earned his Bachelor's degree from Elizabethtown College and thereafter dedicated his professional career to the state's healthcare industry. He was employed by York Behavioral Health in 1975, County Planner with the Department of Health and Human Services in 1980, and ultimately retired as CEO of Wernersville State Hospital in 2002.

Ken was a loving father to his two sons, Alexander W. Ehrhart (Tierney) of Southport, CT and Austin C. Ehrhart (Frances) of Wellesley, MA. As his two boys grew up, he was a committed fan and sideline staple at their travel soccer, high school football, and college football games. The same love and pride was later extended to his five grandchildren Ava, Turner, Owen, Adam,

and Annabelle.

Lancaster City came to be Ken's home, where he was a familiar face around town, frequenting the arts and theater venues of the city. He owned the Chestnut House for several years in retirement and enjoyed spending countless hours, meals, stories, jokes, drinks, and cigars with friends at the Marion Court Room and the Hamilton Club.

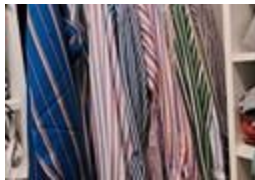
