Richard C. Thompson, 93, died on Monday, July 30, 2012 at Moravian Manor, Lititz. Born in Homer, Ohio in 1919, he was the son of the late Charles Sherman & Nellie Rowe Thompson. He was married to the late Harriett Breidau Thompson, who died in 1993.

Richard served in the U.S. Army Military Police during WWII and married Harriett in 1945. He worked for the Trans Continental Gas Pipeline Corporation for 31 years, in Chester and York Counties, and retired as a Superintendent in 1983. Prior to retirement, he and Harriett moved to Lancaster County, living in Buck and later Lititz.

Richard is survived by two sons: Donald, husband of Emma Thompson of Severn, MD, and David, husband of Lynn Matthews of West Grove, PA; a daughter, Dena Mitchell of Lititz, PA; and six grandchildren: Courtney, Jennifer, Jonathan and Michelle Thompson; Lindsey and Casey Mitchell. He was preceded in death by a brother, Charles Robert Thompson.
